





Remedial System: Remedial system is a part of quality sustenance mechanism. Every Friday one hour special coaching, is given to slow learners and Reappear (RA) category of students.

Based on the framework given, departments develop the work plan of delivering the curriculum to the students through various teaching methodologies.

6.3.2 Teaching and Learning

Language Lab: It helps in fostering the soft skills of the students.

Computer Lab: Computer lab with internet facility serves as an effective means of updating the academic knowledge.

Tutorial: The College implements tutorial system to monitor the academic progress and the overall behaviour of the students. A batch of 15-20 students is taken special care by the deputed teacher in the tutorial hour on every Wednesday.

Career guidance and placement cell arranges coaching and competitive examinations and sessions for personality development of outgoing students.

Projects are given to students to enhance their knowledge.

6.3.3 Examination and Evaluation

A student's academic performance is evaluated on the basis of the internal score for 25 marks and external score for 75 marks. In the process of preparing the consolidated internal score, three monthly tests per semester are conducted. The average of the better two for 20 marks is merged with the assignment for 5 marks.

The examination committee prepares the time table for the internal examinations and monitors the conduct of the examinations, Evaluation of answer papers are done and progress cards are send to the parents on time.

6.3.4 Research and Development

UGC-NET coaching: To prepare and train the students for competitive examinations, the Career

Guidance Cell and UGC-NET coaching has been arranging classes on a regular basis. Five students got selected in the Tamilnadu State Level Eligibility for Lectureship and more than 3 of our students and alumnae got qualified in the Tamilnadu Teachers Eligibility Test conducted by the State Government.

Research: Apart from giving intense coaching to the students from the under privileged section who are also mostly first generation learners, our teachers are actively involved in research, paper presentations and publications both at the national and international level and undertaking research projects. Many serve as research guides and resource persons. Academically the teachers presented 3 papers in International Conference, 25 National Seminars and by getting 23 of their papers published.

The Practice: A batch of 15-20 students are given special coaching by the deputed teacher in the tutorial hour on every Wednesday. The Tutor maintains the details of the students assigned to her to keep track of the growth and development of each student inside the campus. The tutor identifies the problems of the students both academic and personal and act as counsellor. The tutor also identifies the financially backward students and makes arrangements for getting her financial assistance from the appropriate authority.

Evidence of Success: Students discuss their problems openly with their tutors. Tutor maintains a good rapport with the students which helps in identifying the problems immediately and solves them in appropriate manner.

Best Practice – II

Title of the Practice: English Language Lab

Training on communication skills is given to the students to compete in the highly competitive globalised world that we inhabit today. The language lab has been launched with the following goals:

- To enrich the students practical knowledge and wisdom.
- To impart oratory skills to the students.
- To make the students competent in expressing themselves during interactive speeches.

The Context

Majority of students enrolled in the degree course are coming from rural areas and are from Tamil Medium classes. The college took initiative to promote the English language skill by using the Language Laboratory to develop the students English language exposure. This enables the students to develop their language so that the students are aware of advanced knowledge of English language and proficiency. Through a series of lectures the lab tries to make the students fully aware of the existing importance of English language not only for obtaining the knowledge but also for their employability.

The Practice

The students could clear their doubts and difficulties during interactive speeches. The students are made to hear the speeches of eminent personalities in English language. Short plays are screened to improve their pronunciation.

Evidence of success

At the end of the year a viva voce would be conducted where the students express their talents in front of the examiner. This helps them to perform well during seminars inside the class rooms.

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4. Rules and Regulations
